## Section II - Vegetables

201. Collection of vegetables, four kinds, the number of each kind to be the same as single classes
202. A collection of vegetables, three kinds, suitable for a salad
203. Five potatoes (white)
204. Five potatoes (coloured)
205. Peas, seven pods
206. Broad Beans, seven pods
207. French Beans, seven pods
208. Runner Beans, seven pods
209. One lettuce, to be shown as grown, roots in moss or jar
210. Five carrots, trimmed
211. Three parsnips, trimmed
212. Three beetroots, trimmed
213. Nine shallots
214. Three onions
215. Three courgettes, not to exceed $6 \mathrm{in} / 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ in length

222. Collection of culinary herbs, no fewer than four kinds
223. Longest Runner Bean (this class is not included in cup points)

## Section III - Fruit

301. Gooseberries - dish of fifteen
302. Currants Red or White - small dish of not more than $7 \mathrm{oz} / 200 \mathrm{~g}$ of fruit
303. Currants Black - small dish of not more than $7 \mathrm{oz} / 200 \mathrm{~g}$ of fruit
304. Loganberries or Tayberries - dish of fifteen
305. Raspberries - dish of fifteen
306. Any other variety of fruit - dish of five or more

## Section IV - Decorative

Materials and blooms may be purchased. Accessories are allowed. Exhibits must not exceed $24 \mathrm{in} / 61 \mathrm{~cm}$ wide unless otherwise stated
401. A miniature arrangement not to exceed $3 \mathrm{in} / 7.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ diameter
402. A gold, silver and bronze arrangement
403. The Paris Olympics
404. An arrangement of dried flowers, foliage and / or seedheads
405. Have-a-Go - for anyone who normally just dumps their flowers in a jam jar!

## Section V - Children's Entries

A self-portrait in pulses, pasta and rice, on a paper plate - the same theme applies to all age groups
501. Aged under 5 at the date of the Show
502. Aged $5-7$ at the date of the Show
503. Aged 8-11 at the date of the Show
504. Aged $12-16$ at the date of the Show

601. A greetings card incorporating a paper insert

609. A textile or canvas picture - mounted, framed or unframed. Any stitchery on canvas using man-made or natural fibres. Not to exceed $4 \mathrm{ft} / 122 \mathrm{~cm}$ square in area
610. Any handmade item - leather, pottery, wood, jewellery, beading, metal etc (any medium other than textile). Maximum space $2 \mathrm{ft} / 61 \mathrm{~cm}$ square
611. For children aged 16 and under - any handicraft item, free choice

No Handicraft exhibit should have been entered in a previous PHACS show

## Section VII - Photography

701. A black and white photograph, any subject
702. "This Sporting Life", a colour or black and white photograph
703. "Somerset at its Best", a colour photograph
704. "Furry Friends", a colour or black and white photograph
705. First-timers - "My Favourite Flower" a colour photograph, for anyone who has never entered a PHACS photographic competition before
706. For children aged 16 and under - a colour photograph, any subject

No photograph should have been entered in a previous PHACS show. Entries must be $A 4$ or smaller, including mount. Photographs can be mounted or un-mounted

## Section VIII - Homemade Drink

801. An alcoholic drink, made from a kit
(to be exhibited in a glass bottle with appropriate top)
802. An alcoholic drink made without a kit
(to be exhibited in a glass bottle with appropriate top)
803. A non-alcoholic drink made from fruit or flowers
(to be exhibited in a glass or plastic bottle with appropriate top)

## Banksian Medal

## RULES and PROCEDURES

1. Competition is open to all.
2. All exhibits in Sections I, II and III must be bona-fide grown by the Exhibitor or in their possession at least 2 months before the show. Anyone infringing this rule will forfeit all prizes and will not be permitted to exhibit in any future show.
3. All exhibits in the Handicraft Classes must be the unaided work of the competitor.
4. All exhibits must be staged by 10:30am on the day of the Show and must not be removed until the presentation of cups and trophies has been completed.
5. The hall will open from $6 \mathrm{pm}-7 \mathrm{pm}$ on the evening before the Show and from 8am on the day of the Show for staging purposes.
6. Cards, corresponding with the entries, will be given to Exhibitors on the evening before and the morning of the Show and Exhibitors must ensure they are properly placed.
7. Entry forms should be sent in a sealed envelope to:

Anna Toeman, Bagatelle Flat, High Street, TA24 8PY or to Porlock Home and Hardware, no later than Tuesday $16^{\text {th }}$ July. Entry fee 20p per class, or any number of entries for $£ 2.00$. There is no fee for children's entries. No person may enter more than one exhibit per class. Entries for Class 142 will be accepted up until 10.00am on Show Day. No late entries will be accepted.
8. The decision of the judges shall be final. Judges may withhold prizes at their discretion.
9. Any Exhibitor wishing to make an objection shall lodge it in writing with the Secretary before 4 pm on Show Day with a deposit of $£ 1$. The deposit will be forfeited if the objection is not upheld.
10. The Treasurer will pay out the Prize Money from 3pm on Show Day. Money unclaimed by 5.00 pm on Show Day will be forfeited.
11. Membership of the Society is open to all. Membership for 2024 is $£ 5$ per person or $£ 8$ to become a Patron. Please contact the Treasurer for an application form.
12. No dogs are allowed in the Show, except Assistance Dogs.
